Dear Beach Cities Resident,

Teamwork is an important attribute that impacts all of us in multiple ways. By teaming up with the community, Beach Cities Health District (BCHD) has been adaptable and resourceful in stepping up to meet the challenge that COVID-19 has posed, allowing us to assist individual

residents, our fellow employees and the community.

I am very proud of the work we have done in providing COVID-19 tests to our residents, including hundreds of high school student-athletes who must be tested each week in order to participate in their activities. I am equally proud of the adjustments our team has made to be able to provide vaccines to educators, students and staff in the South Bay, including more than 6,200 children ages 5-11 who were vaccinated at clinics throughout the Beach Cities in November and early December.

Teamwork has been an important part of these efforts. Our partners for testing have included the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (Public Health), Providence Little Company of Mary Hospital, the Redondo Beach Fire Department (RBFD) and Police Department (RBPD), Fulgent Genetics, and hundreds of community volunteers who have stepped up to face this public health challenge head on.

To assist with our vaccine efforts, we again teamed with Public Health, Manhattan Beach Fire Department (MBFD), RBFD, RBPD and a cast of enthusiastic, dedicated volunteers. Our school partners also joined the effort – Hermosa Beach City School District, Manhattan Beach Unified School District and Redondo Beach Unified School District.

Our Youth Services department has teamed with allcove to develop an exciting plan for a youth wellness center that is slated to open on our Campus in 2022, bringing extremely important mental health services to people ages 12-25 in the Beach Cities.

Our team has also been hard at work on the Healthy Living Campus project, with our Board of Directors passing a resolution Nov. 17 to select a project, helping to shape our future plans. Our team continues to work diligently with the community on this important, visionary project that will enable BCHD to provide preventive health and wellness programs and services to the community for many years to come.



Year in Review



BCHD Care Manager Charlotte Barnett hosted 27 social hours from July 2020-June 2021 to engage older adults who might have felt isolated during COVID-19. Events were held both virtually and in-person.

In fall 2020, BCHD's Mobile Flu Strike Team administered 227 flu vaccines to vulnerable, homebound individuals in the Beach Cities. BCHD also partnered with local cities to administer flu vaccines.

During the 2020-21 school year, 261 Redondo Beach Unified School District employees across all 13 schools and the District office participated in "WorkWell LiveWell," BCHD's worksite wellness program. Wellness challenges included BCHD's Mental Health & Happiness Series, nutrition workshops, stretch breaks and financial health lunch and learns.



21 videos were posted online as part of the B-Well mental health & happiness campaign in partnership with BeachLife Music Festival. The videos garnered 29,413 total views during the campaign, which ran from February to May 2021.



BCHD transitioned its grade K-5 garden and nutrition programming to a virtual format during COVID-19. 68 videos were created and had 33,875 total views by the end of May 2021.



BCHD's Safe in the South Bay Series brought health experts, cities, chambers, schools and community members together around this fast-moving pandemic for six educational webinars on COVID-19 vaccines, mental health, reopening and much more.



BCHD partnered with health experts, cities, chambers, schools and businesses to offer nine COVID-19 Vaccine Q&A evnts.



In May 2021, BCHD's Care Managers safely returned to in-person client meetings to support our community's older adults. Throughout the pandemic, Care Managers met virtually with clients.

BCHD's Health Priorities



Every three years, Beach Cities Health District assesses the overall health of the Beach Cities using a variety of data sources to prepare a Community Health Report. This report guides our strategic planning process with the indication of health priorities and provides an opportunity to evaluate current programming. It focuses on evidence-based public health practices, which the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention defines as the integration of science-based interventions with community preferences for improving population health.

Nutrition and Exercise

- Increase fruit and vegetable consumption
- Increase exercise participation
- Reduce percentage of children who are obese or overweight



Social-Emotional Health

- Increase stress management across the lifespan
- Decrease bullying
- Decrease suicidal ideation



Substance Use

- Reduce youth alcohol and drug consumption
- Reduce youth vaping
- Maintain low percentage of adult smokers



Cognitive Health

- Promote brain health across the lifespan
- Support the cognitively frail

FY21-22 Priority Based Budgeting



Philosophy:

- The underlying philosophy: how a government entity should invest resources to meet its stated objectives
- Resources should be allocated according to how effectively a program or service achieves the goals and objectives that are of most significant value to the community
- Helps us to better articulate why the services we offer exist, what price we pay for them, and, consequently, what value they offer citizens
- Creates a more transparent budget about what we do
- Clarifies trade-offs between different spending options, service delivery and what citizens pay

Why Now? In a diverse and fast-changing environment, a Priority Based "Program" Budget (PBB) is a vehicle for the District to be adaptive to the growing health needs and gaps in health services in our community — providing a space for trade-off discussions to capitalize on strengths, promote meaningful outcomes and identify innovative solutions.

Priority Based Budgeting is a process used to understand community values, and budget accordingly to those values, while providing flexibility in order to meet the changing needs of the community.

Keeping Older Adults Healthy

Helping Our Community's Most Vulnerable Residents Live Safely in Their Homes

Our team of Care Managers has one mission: help older adults and adults with disabilities in the Beach Cities live independently in their homes for as long as safely possible.

What is Care Management?

Many older adults and adults with disabilities in the Beach Cities need support to continue living in their home. Our Care Management Program is designed to help address the challenges faced by this population—transportation, cleaning, chores, companionship, mobility—by sending BCHD Social Workers, known as Care Managers, to the homes of residents in need to develop customized care plans and connect them to vital resources and services.

What Types of Services are Available?



In-Home Exercise

"MoveWell" Volunteers help clients practice physician-approved exercises in the comfort of their own home.



Errand Assistance

Volunteers assist clients with vital errands, including trips to the grocery store and prescription pick-ups.



Social Support

Care Managers and "Conversation Companion" Volunteers make weekly calls and/or visits to clients in need of social support and friendship.



Healthcare Assistance

Enrollment counselors are available at no-cost to help residents secure health insurance through Covered California, Medi-Cal and other public benefits.

Is There a Cost for Care Management?

Care Management is free for residents of Hermosa Beach, Manhattan Beach and Redondo Beach. Some services have costs depending on income qualifications.

Who is Eligible?

Residents of Hermosa Beach, Manhattan Beach and Redondo Beach who are age 65 and older, as well as adult residents with disabilities.

Keeping The Community Healthy

Beach Cities Well-Being Improves While National Numbers Decline

The Gallup National Health and Well-Being Index (WBI), which polls adults nationwide on social, purpose, financial, community and physical well-being, was first collected in the Beach Cities in 2010 as a baseline of our community health status. Most recently, Gallup collected new Beach Cities data in fall 2020. The 2020 results show the Beach Cities earning a WBI score of 68.3, outpacing California (62.2) and the United States (61.2).






Did you know?

Since the School Well-Being Line began operating in October 2020, BCHD has received more than **1,700 calls from community members**. More than half of these calls were COVID-19 related, fulfilling one of the School Well-Being Line's major goals of providing guidance and assistance to the community amidst a heightened time of health concern.

Healthy Living Campus Continues Forward

The transformation of our aging 11-acre medical campus in Redondo Beach into a modern, intergenerational Healthy Living Campus moved closer to reality in 2021.

A 1,178-page Environmental Impact Report (EIR), which assessed the potential environmental impacts of the proposed campus and mitigations to reduce them, was certified by the BCHD Board of Directors in September. In November, following 3 ½ hours of presentations, public comments and deliberations, the board selected a campus project.

Next steps include applying for a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) with the city of Redondo Beach, selecting an operator for the Residential Care for the Elderly facility and awarding a design-build construction contract, with a tentative start for construction in 2023.

In May 2017, BCHD began planning to update our medical campus property, which stretches from Diamond Street to Beryl Street and Prospect Avenue to Flagler Lane. Since then, there have been four revisions to the proposed plan based on input from more than 60 meetings and more than 1,000 comments; from financial, seismic and architectural experts; and from public surveys, trade-off discussions and, ultimately, the EIR.

With each revised plan, BCHD has moved closer to the vision of developing a community health center that offers a continuum of care for all ages. Now, after 4 ½ years of design, concept and construction modifications, the selected project features:

- A youth wellness center with a focus on mental health (for ages 12 25)
- Approximately two acres of active open green space
- Residential Care for the Elderly (reduced from 420 units to 217, including memory care)
- Program for All-inclusive Care for the Elderly, or PACE, an outpatient program that includes medical care, medication management and adult day health care services
- Bike and pedestrian paths
- A new energy-efficient, seismically compliant facility
- Programmable space for community services and activities, creating greater access to BCHD's robust preventive health programs
- Building height limited to 83 feet and under (the tallest building on the current campus is 76 feet)
- Buildings shifted to the north behind the Vons center and away from the Torrance-facing side of the campus
- Minimized construction time: five years in two phases (originally nine years in three phases)
- Phase Two: Community Wellness Pavilion, aquatics and new Center for Health & Fitness









By upgrading the Healthy Living Campus to expand Beach Cities' health programs and services, with a focus on emerging technologies and innovation, BCHD will continue to effectively provide a blend of wellness, prevention and research for current and future generations throughout Hermosa Beach, Manhattan Beach and Redondo Beach.

Named "Healthcare District of the Year" by the Association of California Healthcare Districts

The announcement came during the Association of California Healthcare Districts (ACHD) annual meeting and 2021 awards ceremony in September. Thank you to our community, partners, volunteers and staff for helping us to receive this award— we couldn't have done it without you! The District of the Year Award honors a healthcare district that implemented one or more initiatives to improve the health and well-being of their community. A panel of outside judges scores all nomination materials. There are 77 healthcare districts in ACHD.





Beach Cities Health District Honored for Financial Reporting

California Society of Municipal Finance Officers (CSMFO) presented BCHD with an Excellence Award for its 2020-21 operating budget. BCHD is the only healthcare district to meet the CSMFO standards of excellence and has received 16 CSMFO Excellence or Meritorious Awards since the 2007-2008 fiscal year.

Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) has also presented a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting to BCHD for its Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020. This is the second consecutive year GFOA awarded BCHD its Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for its comprehensive annual financial report. Earlier this year, GFOA also awarded BCHD the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award with a Special Performance Measures Recognition.


