Community Open House

Summary Report
March 23, 2019



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1. INTRODUCTION

Beach Cities Health District's (BCHD) Outreach Team conducted a Community Open House (Open House) in the City of Redondo Beach on March 23, 2019, prior to the commencement of the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) process for the Beach Cities Healthy Living Campus. This meeting provided residents and community members with opportunities to learn about the project being considered, provide comments and ask questions directly to project team members.

This event was the third public Open House pertaining to the Healthy Living Campus project. The first, held August 29, 2017, introduced conceptual plans and sought feedback regarding the Center for Health and Fitness. The second, held October 17, 2017, introduced the project to the community, discussed the purpose, presented initial site renderings and sought feedback from the general public.

An additional Open House event specifically for BCHD volunteers was held July 17, 2017. In addition to introducing the project concept, the event included a prioritization activity regarding the campus features that are most important to BCHD volunteers.

This report summarizes the March 23, 2019 Open House event and feedback received.

1.1 Purpose of Community Open House

The community Open House was held in Redondo Beach to provide the general public with updated information about the Healthy Living Campus project, visualizations of its design, walking tours of the campus and opportunities for public involvement. The event also highlighted the programs and services provided by BCHD.

2 COMMUNITY OPEN HOUSE – MARCH 23, 2019

2.1 Overview

The Healthy Living Campus Open House was hosted at the Beach Cities Health District Campus at 10:00 a.m. (Appendix A: Program). The community event, open to the public, had 136 people pre-registered. Approximately 139 people verified attendance by signing-in at a registration table set up near the campus entrance (Appendix E: Sign-in Sheet).

The Open House consisted of information stations set up in pop-up tents in the campus parking lot. This format provided opportunities for participants to visit the campus, experience BCHD programs and services, actively engage in meaningful discussion with staff, ask questions, provide feedback and obtain information in a self-paced process.

The information stations featured BCHD programs and services as well as information on the Healthy Living Campus. The Healthy Living Campus information stations were arranged by topic and contained printed information (Appendix B) including conceptual renderings. The stations were staffed by BCHD staff and volunteers who were available to answer attendee questions.

BCHD CEO Tom Bakaly and BCHD Executive Director of Real Estate Leslie Dickey led walking tours of the campus that highlighted features proposed by the Master Plan concept, demonstrated perimeters of proposed buildings and discussed proposed building heights.

2.2 Healthy Living Campus Information Stations

Project information was presented by topic at information stations in the back parking lot of the BCHD property in Redondo Beach. Each station was staffed by knowledgeable project staff who engaged with attendees to provide further information and/or answer questions. The stations were as follows:

"I'm a member of BCHD gym, I don't participate in other activities, I love the dog park (please don't take down the dog park)

I'm interested in senior housing, I'm 65+, my rents keeps going up. I hope you will have room for healthy residents like the senior living facility on Carnelian. Is there a website (where) I can keep abreast of your progress?" -Debbie Whipple

"Love idea for the expanded campus-very concerned about parking. Already hard to park to get to the gym late mornings. Would like to be part of parking planning."-Babette Wald

"I am a retired engineer. The concept proposed building pictured in the Breeze looks like one enormous parking structure because of the large opening in the walls pictured." -Joe Glasgow

Two emailed comments were received:

"Do you know if it will have a pool? That was the one thing that I thought would be really good for our community – gentle exercise and saves on water having a community one.

I hope the elderly residential facility is going to be affordable – when my friend was trying to get into Silverado recently the costs were outrageous – something like \$17,000 a month if I heard correctly. My mum was in a really nice facility in England for under \$3,000 month – everything included....including medication management and of course health care is available for all over there too.

Oh well, I suppose we are making some progress but still a long ways to go."

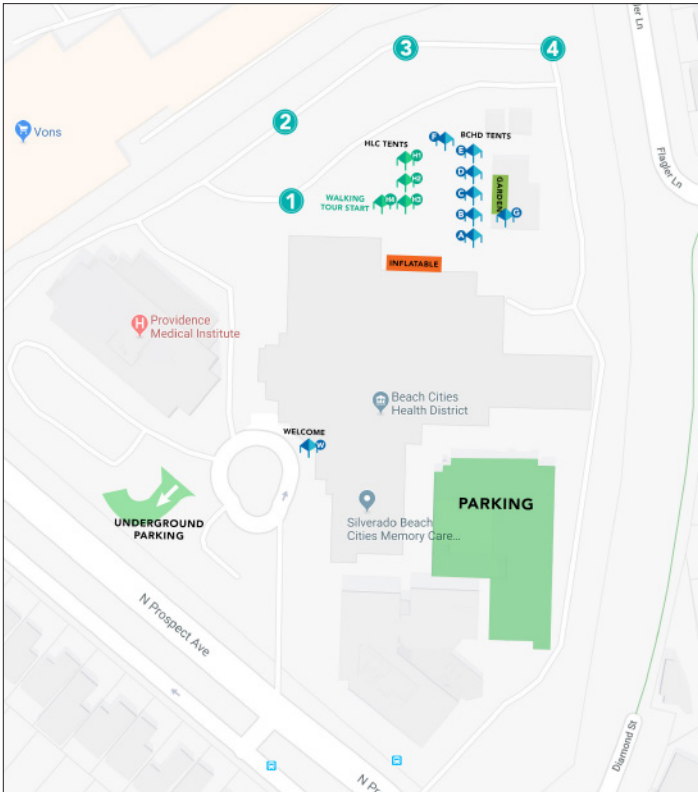

1. Consider expanding the size of the RCFE from 400 to 500 units. It increases potential revenue and also makes the certified EIR more robust. It is much easier to back down the project size, than to increase later.
2. Analyze a swap of Phase 2 and Phase 3, since Phase 2 has less revenue producing assets than Phase 3 does.
3. Provide a summary of all (both?) the market studies since it's been 2 years, give or take, since we've seen the first one.
4. The Saturday open house went well in my estimation. Participants were pleased when they hear about all the public participation process - such as CEQA
5. BCHD needs to understand that it is the agency that must defend any CEQA litigation, since BCHD is the certifying agency. BCHD has little or no experience as a lead agency
6. Consider "heading off" new RCFE projects and move them into the BCHD project in order to assure adequate market size.
7. Project opposition and litigation most likely to come from directly impacted radius of the project, for example, a 0.5 to 1.0 mile radius."

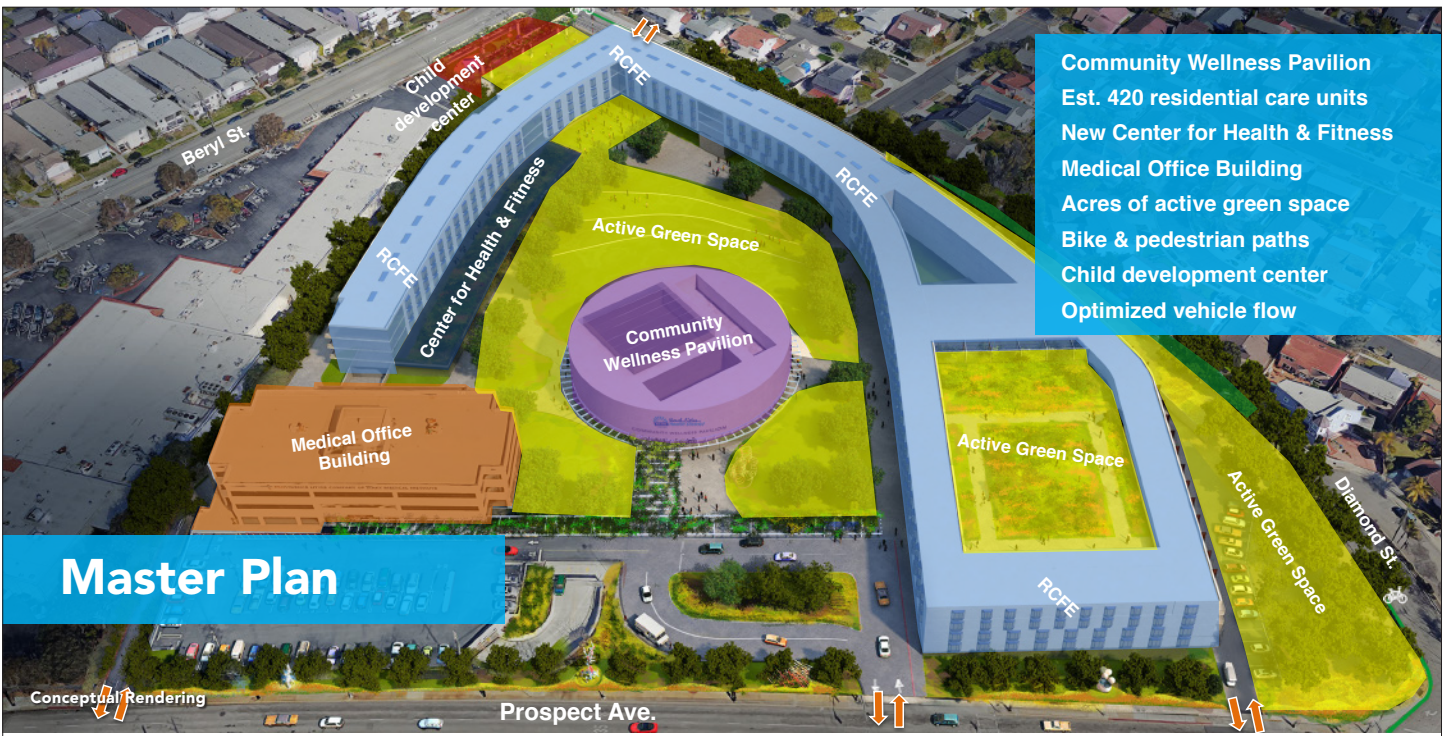
