Service Streams



Clinical services: Mental health

Recommended evidence-based short-term mental health services may include:

- Assessment and screening
- Brief face-to-face mental health interventions with the young person and their family
- Psychological or psychiatric consultation and brief intervention
- Individual motivational interviewing with the young person

- Mental health awareness and psychoeducation with the young person
- Mental health awareness and psychoeducation with family
- General family support to assist families in supporting their young people
- Group programs for young people and families
- Referral and linkages to other services

Clinical services: Physical health

Physical health services at allcove may include:

- Physical exam and checkup
- Gynecological exam (pap, breast)
- STD testing and treatment
- HIV prevention pre-exposure prophylaxis (assessment and prescription)
- Pregnancy testing

- Birth control and emergency contraceptive
- Nutrition service
- Flu shot
- TB testing
- Immunization
- Vision and hearing exam

Clinical services: Substance use

Recommended evidence-based short-term substance use services may include:

- Assessment and screening
- Brief face-to-face substance use interventions with the young person and their family
- Counseling
- Group programs for young people and families
- Referral and linkages to other services

- Narcan/Naloxone education
- Overdose prevention and response trainings
- Prevention education
- Youth-led advocacy opportunities
- Smoking cessation
- Harm reduction initiatives like anonymous medication surrender or needle exchanges

Peer support

Young people can connect with peers their own age who've been through what they are going through and can help them make sense of it all.

Peer support services at allcove may include:

- Peer welcome upon entrance to allcove Beach Cities
- Peer support resource referrals and case management by Peer Support Specialists
- Peer-to-peer tutoring

- Peer support groups for young people
- Peer-led workshops and trainings

Family support

For family members seeking to connect the young people in their lives to resources and support with whatever they are facing

Family support services at allcove may include:

- Parent/Family support groups
- Parent/Family psychoeducation and workshops
- Skill development supports: Parent/partner model, how to motivate your teen, for example

Supported education and employment

Supported education and employment services at allcove may include:

- Tutoring
- Career coaching
- Financial literacy workshops
- Mentorship
- College application supports

- Resume-building and interviewing practice
- Job placement referrals
- Job readiness (what to do after you get a job, what to ask, etc.)
- Time management preparation
- Strengths assessments
- Training courses

Life skills and wellness services

Life skills and wellness services at allcove may include:

- Workshops and trainings on culinary arts, housing, independence, gardening and laundry
- Courses and classes in yoga, mindfulness, hope, coping skills and more
- Therapeutic opportunities for art and music, and other creative outlets
- Purpose workshops

- Outdoor field trips/ nature days
- Certifications in CPR, babysitting, emergency preparedness
- Animal therapy

What is the datacove?

- 1. Centralized registry for all youth, providers, and staff interacting with services at allcove centers
- 2. Supports care and clinical practice
 - A place for providers to learn a youth's story through the collection of the allcove minimum data set (MDS) – so youth do not have to repeat information multiple times
- 3. Allows for program evaluation and quality improvement





datacove: Centralized data collection system

datacove: Centralized allcove registry sitting parallel to lead agency EHR systems



allcove minimum data set (MDS)

- Youth and providers will be able to complete MDS questions through secure tablet-based data entry functionality.
- This data will then be immediately accessible to their allcove care team to support care & clinical practice.

Financial sustainability

Goals

- Services will be provided free of charge to young people 12-25.
- allcove centers will become self-sustaining through a mix of public-private partnerships and novel reimbursement models.

allcove

Short-term

- Mental Health Services Act funds will provide funding for the four-year pilot in Santa Clara County and seed funding for allcove centers in five other California communities.
 - **BCHD receiving \$2 million from state grant for 4-year term** (December 2021-2025)
- Lead agencies are charged with raising additional funds and pursuing available mechanisms for service reimbursement.
 - BCHD receiving \$1 million of funding from federal earmark (June 2022-2025)

Long-term

Stanford's Center for Youth Mental Health and Wellbeing and Mental Health Services Oversight and Accountability Commission will work with local grantees to:

- Explore and develop public reimbursement funding mechanisms for allcove services.
- Explore and pursue reimbursement of cost sharing with private payers.

Retail Cannabis Initiatives in the Beach Cities

• Cannabis proponents have circulated initiative petitions that would allow for commercial cannabis dispensaries in Hermosa Beach, Manhattan Beach and Redondo Beach.

• All three petitions have gathered enough signatures to qualify for upcoming elections and each of the City Councils are discussing potential options of whether to:

- 1. Adopt their own ordinances
- 2. Place competing initiatives on the ballot
- 3. Maintain their existing bans on commercial cannabis











Hermosa Beach

- The ballot initiative for the November 2022 election calls for two retail cannabis storefront businesses and the delivery of cannabis products.
- Hermosa Beach established a Cannabis Advisory Group and City Council has heard their recommendations on whether to oppose the initiative and maintain the ban, adopt their own ordinance or place a competing measure on the ballot.
- City Council will discuss the next steps at their city council meeting on May 10, 2022.











Manhattan Beach

- The ballot initiative would allow for three retail cannabis storefront businesses and the delivery of cannabis products.
- At the May 3, 2022 City Council meeting, staff will prepare a report on the impacts of the initiative and outline potential options the Council can move forward with.











REDONDO BEACH NIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

Redondo Beach

- The ballot initiative for the March 2023 election would allow for three retail cannabis storefront businesses and the delivery of cannabis products.
- Redondo Beach established a Cannabis Steering Committee which discussed a commercial cannabis ordinance and presented their recommendations to the Council.
- The Planning Commission reviewed a draft ordinance that would establish two retail licenses. Their recommendations include that retailers be at least 600 ft away from elementary schools, day cares and youth centers and at least 1,500 ft away from high schools and middle schools.
- The City Council will consider the ordinance at a future meeting.











Cannabis Policy Considerations in the Beach Cities

What role can our coalition have with the cannabis policy considerations in the Beach Cities over the next 6 months?

- 1) Organize and host a community cannabis forum event
- 2) Implement youth focused curriculum/education directed towards school community
- 3) Educate parent/guardian stakeholders through existing meetings (e.g., PTA, wellness councils)
- 4) Activate community members to educate residents on the upcoming ordinances and initiatives
- 5) Expand Beach Cities specific qualitative data collection and share findings
